

Dear Church,

Happy 2024! I'm wondering where 2023 went. Growing up I recall my great uncles and aunts (grandparents, too) remarking on how fast time passes. I now understand what they meant. Time passes rapidly. My maternal grandmother often said, "The days are long but the weeks pass fast." Regardless, 2024 is all but here.

So, what will the New Year have instore? On the negative side lots and lots of political ads. But, seriously, what will the new year bring? Well, I don't know. Maybe good things; perhaps some things not so good. Regardless of what 2024 has, there are commitments that we can make that will insure that 2024 will be a great year.

First, we have a new statement that defines why we, as a church family, exists. Our vision (our target) is "Being the church in Salem and to the nations." A congregation can be many things. It can be an audience. That is, a group of spectators watching others "do their thing." It's like going to a concert, or attending a ball game. Those in the audience watch—this is what they mainly do. Secondly, a congregation can be like participants at a party. There is excitement, there are people moving and having fun, and there is a lot of noise. However, "being the church" does not lend itself to merely watching. Involvement in the mission of the church is vital. Therefore, involvement is essential! In addition, "being the church" is not a quest to have fun. It must be more than that. Yet, we cannot experience "being the church" without understanding what the church is.

Our core values arise directly out of the Bible. The foundational commitments of "being the church" are first devotion to the Bible's instruction. This is growing more and more unique in churches today; however, we must believe and practice what the Bible instructs. This should be "without saying," unfortunately, this is not the case. Secondly, devotion to fellowship. We need each other and this fellowship referred to here is sharing in the lives of other believers in Christ. Next, in Acts 2:42, we discover the "being the church" is devotion to the breaking of bread. This can include eating together but it probably suggests that was Celebrate the Lord's Supper with reverence and respect. This ordinance calls for us to remember the sacrifice the Lord Jesus made for us on the cross. And fourthly, devotion to prayers. "Being the church" demands that we be a praying people. This, too, should be without saying." However, have you notice how hard it is to consistently pray? Satan and his army will do whatever they can to keep you from praying. Your phone will ring, your mind will wander, your TV or cell phone will steal your attention rather than pray.

Now, there are the strategies that are crucial in "being the church." Because of limited space in our newsletter, I will merely mention them here and return next month. These are the "actions" that must be carried out in order to "be the church." Each one has strong biblical support. These "actions" of a church are: evange-lism, discipleship, fellowship, ministry, and worship. There are a lot of ministries was can devote our resources to, but the above serves as a filter enabling us to "be the church is Salem and beyond."

Happy New Year! One of the most famous traditions of New Year's Day is the making of resolutions for the new year. Often it seems these resolutions rarely last a week, much less an entire year. If you look at gyms right after January 1st, you will notice a lot of people there that you don't usually see at gyms. However, by March or April, all of these people will have disappeared. Evidently their desire to get in shape or stay healthy was not as strong as their desire to stay in the position they started in. As Jesus famously said, "The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak."

How do we make resolutions that will actually stick? The first thing we need to do is prayerfully consider what goals are actually attainable. It is impossible to run a marathon without any training. In the same way, we often have to start small and work our way up to our goals. Prayer goes a long way in starting off our resolutions. If we earnestly ask God for something that will accomplish His will He will give us the strength to accomplish it. Before you set out to accomplish that goal for God, pray earnestly about it and ensure it is something He wants you to do.

One resolution for our church to accomplish in 2024 is to be the church in Salem and to the nations. This is our vision statement for our church. How do we "be the church?" It starts with our own unity. We need to ensure we can all move in the same direction together to accomplish the same goals that the early church did. If we want to bring others to Christ and watch our church grow, it must start with an internal unity. We need to care for one another in love and work together to make everyone feel welcome. We

also need to work together in ministries that encourage people to come join us at church. Our Awana clubs are a great example of this kind of ministry. Sometimes we need to drop ministries that no longer work and try new strategies. Keep in mind, we do not want to create "gimmick" ministries, but we must work to meet the needs of the people we want to reach. Today's families are broken and hurting. The "nuclear family" is a bygone concept to today's culture. How can we reach all of the family and bring them together in Christ?

We live in a dying society where people are going more and more astray down the pathways of sin and death. The only way they can be reached is through personal witness. The Bible says in Romans 10:14, "How then are they to call on Him in whom they have not believed? How are they to believe in Him whom they have not heard? And how are they to hear without a preacher?" The term "preacher" here is not simply referring to a pastor but to anyone spreading the Gospel message. This also does not mean that you must give a full and complete telling of the Gospel in every conversation but you should go into conversations with lost friends thinking about how to bring those ideas to the forefront.

Many people today are extremely uncomfortable with the church and what it represents. Some believe it holds no power in the world today and others believe they are too far gone to be forgiven by anyone. In both cases, they refuse to come to church and hear the life-changing words of God in His Word. It is good for us that the Bible never defines the church as a building. The early church in the Bible had no dedicated buildings. They would use their own houses to meet. There is no reason we cannot do the same today.

If you know someone who would never step foot inside a church building, invite them to your home for a Bible Study with some friends. They will still hear the words of the Bible and perhaps turn from their sins after being convicted by the Holy Spirit. Of course, the goal is still to get them to church so they can fellowship with other believers (assuming hopefully that they become believers) but sometimes it starts at home.

As we go into this new year, think and pray about how God would use the unique gifts He has given you to further the message of the Gospel and turn Salem into a place where the church of God thrives. With your help, this can be the best year the church has ever had. We have so many opportunities to reach the lost and dying in our community. Let's keep the resolution to reach them all year long.

I would like to explain the Dewey Decimal System which we use in our library. Melvil Dewey organized/categorized books by their subjects and gave each subject a number heading.

000's - Generalities 500's - Natural Science and Math

100's - Philosophy/Psychology
 200's - Religion
 300's - Social Sciences
 600's - Technology
 700's - The Arts
 800's - Literature

400's - Language 900's - Geography and History

The call number is on the spine of each book and in the upper left hand corner of that book's author, title and subject cards in the card catalog. You can look up an author, title or subject, write its call number on a post-it note in the borrower's box; then go to the shelf to find your book on the shelves which are in numerical order from left to right. If you need help, you can check with Sharon or me.

I just finished reading an excellent book by John MacArthur! In <u>Twelve Ordinary Men</u>, he looks into the personality of each disciple. What an unusual group of common men Jesus chose for an uncommon calling!

One of my favorite parts was on page 34 when Mr. MacArthur was writing about Peter, the Rock.

"Jesus changed Simon's name, it appears because He wanted a nickname to be a perpetual reminder to him about who he should be. And from that point on, whatever Jesus called him, sent him a subtle message. If He called him Simon, He was signaling to him that he was acting like his old self. If He called him Rock, He was commending him for acting the way he ought to be acting."

While we don't know as much as we would like about each disciple, Mr. MacArthur reminds the reader that the vessel is not the issue... the Master is. And the Master still uses ordinary men like us! My prayer for all of us this year is that we are willing to listen to and be used by Him.

## Bryce Nattier Sharing about their Ministry on Sunday, January 28 at 7PM.

Bryce and Natasha (Murry) Nattier serve at Hopital de l'Esperance (Hospital of Hope) in Mango, Togo, Africa. Bryce is a general surgeon which often extends into orthopedic surgeries for many broken bones from motorcycle wrecks – their dominant form of transportation. Natasha serves as a nurse practitioner who focuses on women's health issues. Patients are from 4 countries; some of the patients walk from neighboring Benin, Burkina Faso, Gha-

na and Nigeria. Each patient is explained the story of Jesus and His being the Way of true Salvation. The hospital staff also holds services in village churches with the aid of native chaplains who work at the hospital. A village for which they had been praying recently invited Bryce and Natasha to begin holding church services in their village. A couple from the village had received medical treatment at the Hospital of Hope.

Bryce and Natasha have served in Mango since 2017 and have six children who keep life extremely interesting! Elliahana – 17, Andrew – 15, Sofia – 13, Ahnilyse – 10, Me'lyna – 5, and Josiah – 3. 


