Dear Church Family,

There is a misconception that many people have: Sunday School is for children. To be sure, Sunday School is an important ministry to children, to help them grow and mature in the Lord. Sunday School, however, is also a vital ministry to adults. Perhaps it is the name that causes some adults to think that investing an hour on Sunday morning in a Sunday School class is a waste of their time. In reality, this hour is Bible Study (or at least it should be). Jesus commanded that we should be "... teaching them to observe all that I commanded you ..." (NASB). One effective venue to carry out this command is in Sunday School. People are instructed not only what the Bible teaches but also taught what it means to be a follower of the Lord Jesus.

Sunday School (or as I prefer, Bible Study) offers us some positive benefits. First, it provides a place to boost Bible knowledge. There are more Bibles and more translations of the Bible available today than any other period in history. However, there is also a higher degree of biblical illiteracy today than in past years. Familiar Bible stories are not "familiar" with a multitude of people today (probably not even with your neighbors). A second benefit of Sunday School is the building of character. Character appears to be in short supply in our nation these days. Not that long ago, there was a news story from a southern part of the nation of a school principal who emailed pornography to several teachers. Even though this became public knowledge, his contract with the school system was extended for another year. What does this communicate to students? We need to teach character.

Thirdly, Sunday School provides spiritual care. I understand that some might object to this statement, "I went through a crisis and no one from church called me." We are still fallen human beings and no one is prefect. Unfortunately, we will disappoint each other. Even with these failures, Sunday School is a small group experience where spiritual care can be most effectively given.

If you are not involved in Sunday School, please give this some thought. You may be missing out on something that will bless your life and your participation may bless the lives of others.

There is an epidemic moving throughout American churches right now. It is a sickness focused on the individual, and it is creating churches filled with people who only think in terms of themselves. This manifests in a multitude of different ways, but the results are the same in the end. These churches end up so focused on pleasing individual people that they forget their purpose is to please God.

One of the first places this begins is in worship. Many churches today have forgotten what worship is. Psalm 95 describes the worship of the Israelites as giving praise to God for who He is. Verses 1-3 read, "Oh come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation! Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! For the Lord is a great God, and a great King above all gods." The primary focus is to be on God and His greatness.

In addition, another purpose of getting together to worship is because God wants us to encourage one another. When we see others worshipping God, it can inspire us to worship as well. Colossians 3:16 states, "Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you, with all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another with psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, singing with thankfulness in your hearts to God." All sorts of music is used here to bring glory to God.

A problem arises however when we seek to individualize any of the worship on Sunday. Please note, the music is not the only part of the service that is "worship." But it is one of the easiest areas of corporate worship to twist away from its intended purpose. One way we do this is by getting annoyed at certain pieces of music that do not fit our personal preferences. Another way churches do this is by isolating individuals by using dimmed lights and singing just from the stage. Our worship on Sunday mornings is to be directed towards God, not ourselves, and it is to be done with the others in the congregation.

Sadly, many churches have embraced the idea of making music and other elements of preaching in their churches mere entertainment. Instead of trying to facilitate a worshipful attitude, they are happy to instead provide a great show that they hope will make visitors stick around. These can be well-intentioned ideas, but in the end they only serve to harm the faithful and provide nothing of substance to the visitors they so eagerly want to please.

One final word of warning involves the account of Uzzah, found in 2 Samuel 6. At that time, the Ark of the Covenant was being transported to Israel from Philistine territory. David was overjoyed and spared no expense, purchasing a brand new cart to transport the ark. During the journey, the cart hit a bump in the road and a man named Uzzah reached out to steady the ark. As he touched it, he died. Why did God kill him? Because David and his group were not worshipping properly. The ark had instructions for carrying, and they were disregarded. We must approach God on His terms, not ours.

MISSION MOMENT

The Lord continues to open doors for us to enter into the lives of people from many different backgrounds, cultures and languages through their diverse medical needs. Each of us has a story that God is writing, and it really is a privilege to be trusted to walk with patients through lives/stories and to be a part of how God is working in their lives. It's also amazing to see healing through compassionate medical care that allows them to change the focus of their life from these huge medical needs that have consumed significant amounts of time, money, and worry. Some of these needs we can treat, but others require a higher level of care not available at the Hospital of Hope or other hospitals here in Togo. However, through relationships with other medical missionaries whose missions hospitals have greater resources, we have been able to get the medical care needed outside of Togo. (In next month's newsletter, I will share the story of two brothers with holes in their intestines who came to the hospital for help.)

The PAACS program (5 years of surgical training and discipleship) which was instituted a year ago is growing. Two new residents, including the first Togolese doctor, began in January. We were excited to have Josue join a bit early, Oct. 1, to start making the difficult transition from French to English. The PAACS residents are required to do their testing in English, which can be problematic.

In September, we were able to gather all the residents and many of the faculty from both PAACS Togo hospitals for a spiritual retreat. Revelations 21:1-8 made us think about a future with God with no more tears, no more death, mourn-

ing nor pain. The medical work can be quite heavy at times as we see the severe suffering in their patients and friends. As surgeons, we often struggle with tough questions on what is best in their context, or what can and cannot be done. It was helpful to be reminded that the suffering and pain are not forever. We seek to treat and care for their patients with the compassionate care that Christ demonstrated, hoping one day they may dwell together with God as mentioned in verse 3.

Prayer Requests:

Our Family: Elliahana, our oldest child, is currently working through college applications. As parents, this is certainly a big milestone. Please pray for her and us as we work through this together and prepare for what the future holds.

Our Team: Our team will have a lot of changes coming up to begin in the summer of 2025. Please pray for those who will be here serving during that time. We are as ALWAYS in need of more workers for the ministry here. Please pray Matthew 9:37-38. Pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest.

Our PAACS team: Please pray for Josue Drafor who started at our hospital October 1, and Franck, from Cameroon, who is the second doctor to join us.

TRUSTEE REPORT

There are always repairs and additional installations that must be done in a church building as old as ours. A flush valve was repaired in the men's downstairs restroom. I appreciate Mike Pugh taking care of this project. A motor for the air handler in the closet in Room 116 was replaced. The air handler takes care of heating or cooling, depending on the season of the year, for rooms 114, 115, 116, and Odds and Ends. A doorbell is being installed on the east door. The doorbell will ring in the kitchen/dining room and the office. This will allow someone to let you enter with food or a meeting in that area of the building. All of the outside doors are always locked (except on Sundays and Wednesday night) for security reasons, but the doorbell will allow you to notify someone in the kitchen/dining room that you need to enter that side of the building for some reason. Remember, all doors except the north and west door of the sanctuary are locked during Sunday morning worship services. Also, there are lights which will be installed by the stairs on the southeast corner of the sanctuary. Hopefully this will help people be more aware of the stairs. The concrete stop blocks were also realigned in all the parking lots. They get moved when cars hit them and/or when snow is removed. A loose railing going to the sanctuary balcony has also been repaired.

On Sunday, September 16, snow and ice were cleared near the doors. The decision was made not to scrape the parking lots with the thought that the snow on top of the ice would give more traction to walk on than if the snow was removed leaving a solid sheet of ice. Thank you for being careful. I was surprised at the end of the morning worship service to find that most of the snow and ice had melted on the parking lots.


