



Dear Church Family,

As we turn the pages of Scripture, one of the most surprising books we encounter is the Book of Jonah. Many know it as the story of "Jonah and the great fish," but the real heart of the story is not about a man swallowed by the sea—it is about a God whose mercy is deeper than the ocean.

Jonah tried to run from God's call, but he discovered that we can never outrun the Lord's presence or His purposes. Even in the belly of the fish, Jonah prayed, and God heard him. This is a reminder for us all: no matter how far we stray, we are never beyond the reach of God's mercy.

The book also teaches us something uncomfortable but essential—God's compassion extends even to those we might consider our enemies. Jonah struggled with this truth, but God gently reminded him, and us, that His love is not limited by our preferences or prejudices.

So, what does Jonah teach us today?

- 1. **God is patient**—He pursues us even when we resist Him.
- 2. **God is merciful**—He hears us when we repent and call out to Him.
- 3. God is compassionate—His love reaches beyond us to those who desperately need Him.

Let this encourage you: God is not finished with you, no matter where you've been or how you've failed. And He invites us to join Him in extending His mercy to others.

May we, unlike Jonah, run toward God's calling and not away from it.

In addition, I ask that you pray regularly for both Awana and Good News Clubs. Awana resumed on September 21. In this ministry, God's Word is front and center. Children (clubbers) are encouraged to commit Scripture to memory. This "hiding God's Word in one's heart" makes it possible for the Holy Spirit to bring to mind that which is committed to memory when it is needed most. The Good News Club is beginning September 30. This is a Bible Study that is housed in public schools. Instead of asking children to come to us—we are going to them. Please pray for these ministries, the leaders, and the children.

This month I wanted to speak more as the Youth Director than write something based on a principle or idea. Over the past month some big things have been happening with our youth here, both good and concerning. As a church, it is important to remember that these young men and women are the next generation. That term gets thrown around a lot and I don't enjoy repeating buzzwords. But these young men and women are the current and future church, with all that entails.

First, the good. We are seeing active growth in all of our youth ministries. Awana has split between Jr. and Sr. High because of this growth and the Life Group is next, if a few more people can volunteer up there. We average about fifteen students on a given Wednesday night with a good ratio of boys and girls. More importantly, they are inviting their friends to experience the teaching of the Gospel. We see a unique passion and energy from them and they are motivated to live for Christ in a world that is dead-set against them.

Going further off that point, I want to get into a more concerning development with our youth. Most if not all of you are aware of the recent murder of Charlie Kirk. Some of you may have even seen the video of the event after searching for it. I took a poll a couple of weeks ago on a Wednesday night and asked our youth how many of them were aware that the murder had happened. All of them were aware. I asked how many had seen the video. Over two-thirds had. I asked how many of them had gone looking for it. None of them had. It had effectively been shoved right in their faces by an uncaring social media algorithm which does not care if content is suitable for those audiences, only that it was getting clicks and attention.

I am not decrying social media. But you do need to be aware that a lot of these young men and women are going to see events like this happen in real time. It is part of their reality. They are now acutely aware of what standing up for your faith can mean. Despite that, they are still determined to live for Christ. They want to use their talents to further the Gospel and the Kingdom of Christ.

Please be praying for our youth department. They need it more than you could ever realize. They are the leaders of the church and they have a lot of questions about the world. If you can, I urge you to take the time and interact with them. Thank you for the constant support you give to our youth ministry.

Our newest fiction book series is by Francine Rivers and is titled Mark of the Lion. This trilogy, set in first century Rome, follows Hadassah, a Jewish slave girl, Marcus, a Roman aristocrat seeking faith, and Atretes, a Germanic gladiator fighting for freedom. One reviewer stated that you feel as though you there as a part of the story. The characters seem real so it is easy to identify with them. The author incorporates the grace, truth, and the love God has for all people.

<u>A Voice in the Wind introduces</u> readers to Hadassah, a young Jewish girl captured and sold into slavery but still holding firm to her faith in God. Though torn by her love for a handsome aristocrat, Hadassah becomes a shining beacon of light in the darkness and depravity around her.

In <u>An Echo in the Darkness</u>, Marcus, a wealthy Roman aristocrat touched by Hadassah's sincere belief, begins to wonder if there's more to this life. As he continues to search for meaning and faith, he is led by a whispering voice from the past that could set him free from the darkness of his soul.

The trilogy concludes with <u>As Sure as the Dawn</u>, which follows Atretes, the high chief of a Germanic tribe who fought as a gladiator and won his freedom. As Atretes sets out to return home with his infant son, only one thing stands in his way: Rizpah, a Christian widow who has cared for the baby since his birth. A preface from Francine Rivers explains her inspiration for the books, a glossary of historical terms is given for easy reference, and discussion questions are given for personal or group use. Millions have been captivated by this popular tale of love, courage, and faith.

#### TRUSTEE REPORT

During the month of September, the trustees were able to complete two projects. The second elevator was inspected and the application for the state permit has been made. It has been a struggle this year to get the inspections and all the paperwork completed. I started in May contacting the company (ATIS) that does the state inspection and the representative from the elevator company (it was Custom Home) that puts the elevator through its operations to make sure it functions properly and safely. The elevator company we are working with this year is Phoenix Elevator in Mt. Vernon. The individual who worked on our elevators from Custom Home died this past year, and they did not have anyone qualified to be present and work with a state inspector, so we had to find a new company. Both elevators must pass an inspection each year according to Illinois State Law. Inspections must be done with the elevator company 's worker and the state inspector present at the same time.

A second project that was completed was the application of two coats of DuckCoat on the roof around the steeple and the roof on the carport. This work is done to keep the two roofs from leaking. I want to thank Ronnie Donoho for helping with this project.






